The Committee is working on in-person education opportunities for 2021 as soon as it's safe for everyone to meet in person including the Stormwater Basics for MS4's.

Committee Updates Continued...

Policy: Works with TDEC to share and update members on state and EPA regulations and policies;

Chair: David Mason, CDM Smith

The TNSA policy committee is tracking a bill (SB 0113) introduced by Senator Gardenhire that has the potential to significantly limit or reduce the revenue generating capacity of stormwater utilities in TN. As introduced, the bill would require municipalities to abate the stormwater owed by a property owner until such fees equal the construction costs of stormwater ponds on-site. TNSA is working with other interested parties in TN to modify the bill's language or to have the bill withdrawn from consideration. TNSA members are encouraged to contact their local representatives about this bill.

The Tennessee Board of Water Quality, Oil & Gas has been rescheduled due to inclement weather to consider approval of the Post Construction Stormwater rule revisions (0400-40-10). The revised rule and response to public comments can be found here: https://www.tn.gov/environment/about-tdec/boards-and-commissions/board-tennessee-board-of-water-quality--oil-and-gas.html Members are encouraged to participate in the hearing if they have additional comments following TDEC's responses. If approved at the hearing, the rule will likely become effective this summer and TDEC is expected to immediately begin working on NPDES MS4 permit renewals that will include the new language.

TNSA BYLAW UPDATES

The board voted on a few changes to the bylaws.

- Term limits have been changed from 2 years to 3 years starting in 2022.
- President Elect Position has been eliminated. President will need to serve one term as Vice-President.
- In order to reduce the size of the board the At-Large MS4 positions will be eliminated after the current members end their term. Thought behind this is that that the North West Region was added several years ago, which increased the size of the board, and MS4 positions went from 13 to 15. That will leave 12 MS4 positions.

Board Size and Spots per Level

MS4 = 2 per Region (6 Regions), 12 total Private = 4 Associate = 2

Individual Level is non-voting and does not have a spot on the board.

NMSA has launched two brief surveys. Each survey is very brief - time to complete both surveys will take 5 minutes.

One survey is focused on MS4 program effectiveness - what is working in stormwater programs and what isn't in a broad context. In short, NMSA wants to know what pects of stormwater programs provide the most and least return on investment in terms National of resources used in the program.

The second survey is focused on stormwater and trash, litter and gross solids. NMSA Stormwater wants to know various aspects of this topic - how much of an issues stormwater and trash Alliance is, does it appear in permits, if/how it is measured, etc.

Both surveys are anonymous. Lastly, there is a tight schedule for both surveys - they will both close at the end of the day on Friday, February 26, 2021.

The Tennessee RiverLine Partnership was founded as a diverse group of river advocates, including UT, TVA, the National Park Service's Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance Program, and several other organizations and agencies, to achieve the Tennessee RiverLine vision.

TDEC Updates

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued the 2021 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Multi-Sector General Permit (MSGP) for stormwater discharges from industrial activity on January 15, 2021. This final permit will become effective on March 1, 2021. For more information, visit EPA's Industrial Stormwater website: https://www.epa.gov/npdes/stormwater-discharges-industrial-activities.

Rather than wait for EPA's final MSGP to inform Tennessee's 2020 Multi Sector Permit (TMSP), TDEC reissued the 2015 TMSP, unchanged, for a term of two years to provide an opportunity to review the final federal MSGP prior to proposing any changes to the TMSP. 

Governor's Environmental Stewardship Awards



The Governor's Environmental Stewardship Awards (GESA) are presented annually to recognize outstanding achievements by individuals, local governments, businesses, organizations, educational institutions, and agencies for successful environmental projects and conservation measures. The awards program was instituted in 1986 by Ernie Blankenship of the Tennessee Department of Environment and Health, a

predecessor of TDEC, and has been adopted by the Governor's office as one of its award programs. Applications are judged in nine different criteria areas, including such items as project results and transferability, as well as three eligibility areas: location within the state of Tennessee, completion of a majority of the project in the current calendar year, and three years of exceptional environmental compliance with TDEC.

GESA are the most prestigious environmental and conservation awards in the state. For more than 30 years, the awards have been presented to individuals and organizations making significant contributions to the

protection and improvement of our natural resources and wildlife.

GESA supports the Governor's priorities of Job and Economic Development and Health and Welfare, while also supporting TDEC priorities of Public/Private Partnerships and Positive Environmental Outcomes.
